State Revolving Fund Project Plan

Clinton Township, MI

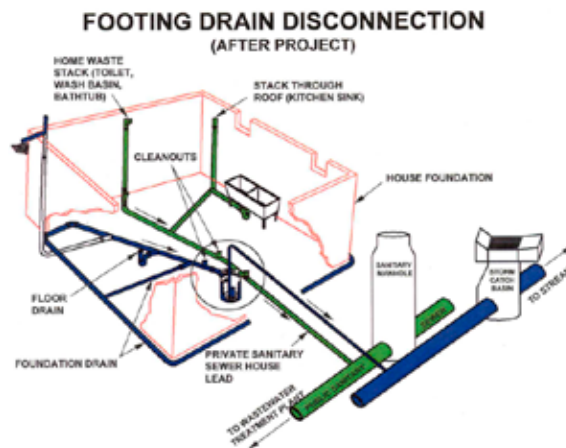
The Charter Township of Clinton is located in the east-central part of Macomb County. It has an area of approximately 18,037 acres and is 19 miles northeast of the City of Detroit. The Clinton River trisects the Township.

The Township had to meet the requirements of the Administrative Consent Order (No. AFO-SW02-001) to eliminate the Township's emergency overflow bypass pump stations located in the southeast part of the Township.

The process of eliminating the bypass pump stations was divided into several segments. This segment of work provided for the reduction of sanitary sewer overflows and included two projects:

1. Lining of sanitary sewer pipes in the area between Groesbeck Highway and Gratiot Avenue, north of Fourteen Mile Road.
2. A footing drain disconnection pilot program on 26 houses in the area east of Gratiot Avenue south of Metropolitan Highway.

Using MDEQ guidelines for Project Plans, **Spalding DeDecker Associates, Inc. (SDA)** as the Township Engineers developed a project plan for both the State Revolving Fund (SRF) for the lining project and the Strategic Water Quality Initiatives Fund (SWQIF) for the footing drain disconnection project. The Project Plans included background information about the Township, review of several alternatives, developing a cost-effective analysis, and detailing the selected alternative including costs, schedule, environmental impacts, and criteria.
